#### A1 No Small Plans: Greenspace Protection and Land Planning in South County and Aquidneck Island

This session will showcase innovative regional planning projects in two areas battling sprawl. South County's nine towns recently collaborated on an inventory of their natural, cultural/historical, and recreational resources that resulted in a Greenspace Protection Strategy for the region. Aquidneck Island's three communities are working with Naval Station Newport to develop a West Side master plan. With an underused railroad corridor, industrial and Navy property, and ten miles of coastline, the island's west side provides a unique opportunity to plan for the future and address island-wide issues.
