Where the Land Meets the Sea: Hurricane Sandy and Its Impact on Rhode Island's Coastal Archaeological Record

TUESDAY October 2 6:30 PM Narragansett Hurricanes and Nor'easters have routinely battered Rhode Island's south coast, impacting the lives of residents and leaving millions of dollars in property damage. Another important, though often underrecognized, effect is the erosion of archaeological sites that contain valuable and irreplaceable information about past lifeways.

Jay Waller of the Public Archaeology Laboratory Inc. will showcase the results of an unprecedented, systematic study of archaeological sites along Rhode Island's south coast – specifically those damaged by Hurricane Sandy in 2012. This free public program is part of the

South County History Center's series "Resilient Rhode Island: Disasters & Determination in the Ocean State," which is made possible through major funding support from the Rhode Island Council for the Humanities, an independent state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Tour the Green Jacket Shoal Ship Graveyard – By Kayak!

SATURDAY October 6 10:00 AM, 11:00 AM, or 12:00 Noon East Providence David Robinson, a University of Rhode Island Marine Archaeologist, has teamed up with Josh Woinar of Rhode Island Adventure Tours to develop this one-hour journey through the heart of Rhode Island's largest ship graveyard - East Providence's Green Jacket Shoal. Intimately observe remnants a floating dry dock and a century-long accumulation of abandoned wooden vessels that testify to the industrial fervor which transformed Providence into a thriving

commercial waterfront. Sign up through Rhode Island Adventure Tours for one of the three, consecutive time slots; 10:00 AM, 11:00 AM, or 12:00 noon. This is the only Rhode Island Archaeology Month program event that requires a fee. The registration fee of \$45 per individual includes a kayak, paddle, and lifejacket, which will be provided at the Bold Point Park boat launch.

Archaeology and History at the Historic Amos Greene Farm

SATURDAY October 6 10:00AM-4:00 PM Charlestown Archaeologists from the University of Rhode Island and Gray and Pape, Inc. will be on hand to discuss the history and archaeology of historic Amos Greene Farm during the Charlestown Historical Society's grand Revolutionary War Encampment event. Located on beautiful rolling hills just west of Rt. 112, this family farmstead was active throughout

the American Revolutionary War and beyond. The rural coastal area that is now Charlestown is rich with Native American culture, colonial trading histories, agricultural and manufacturing diversity, and early American conflict in a burgeoning republic. Archaeologists will display artifacts, explore the Greene family tree, and assess the farm's varied landscape, stone walls, and structures while groups of colonial reenactors and period vendors portray life as it was 240 years ago. \$5 donation suggested.
