No. 39. RESOLUTION upon the petition of John D. Cranston and others, praying, for the reasons therein stated, for the privilege of constructing a bridge over an arm of a salt water cove at Wickford, in said North Kingstown.

> Voted and Resolved, That the said John D. Cranston, A. B. Rice. James Eldred. and their associates, be and hereby are authorized to erect and maintain a bridge across an arm of a salt water cove at Wickford, in said North Kingstown, from the point known as Cedar Point to Bates' Point, for the purpose of connecting by a public highway the "Ten-rod road," so called, with that part of the village aforesaid known as South Wickford. Said bridge to be twenty-four feet clear span, as high from mean low water mark as the carriage bridge that crosses said cove below said proposed bridge, and leaving the channel in said cove unobstructed by the abutments or piers that sustain and support said bridge.


